Member Project Discussions:

Howard Corey with NC811 presented his narrative with important information such as:

- Ticket volume for Cumberland County.
- NC811 Day is coming up on August 11th.
- Companies calling “Extraordinary Circumstances” after a storm such as a hurricane to make all companies aware that they cannot locate within 3 business day.
- Reminded us that Breast Cancer Awareness Month is October.
- Fall means more deer in the road so he advised us to be careful.

I have attached Howard’s narrative for your reference.

David Guy with the City of Fayetteville stated they are re-lamping Bragg Boulevard and installing a new signal at the intersection of Purdue Drive & Raeford Road.

Tracy Maddox with Piedmont Natural Gas stated they are running gas line in the Cypress Lakes area, valve replacement is being done on Hampton Road, and they are also installing approx. 90’ of gas lines in Edgewater.

Ryan Smith with Piedmont Natural Gas stated they are running gas lines from Chicken Foot Road to Dirtbag Ales. They are also running lines on Varsity Drive, Vanstory Street, and Ramsey Street.

David Norman with the City of Fayetteville stated they are working on a sidewalk project at Sante Fe Drive & Yadkin Road. They are also working on a culvert project on Shoreline Drive.

Sam Powers with Water Resource Engineering stated the Cypress Lakes 7 & 10 is in progress, the Sentinels Subdivision, next phase in Freedom Town Center, and North Fayetteville Force Main project is all in process.

Kenny Hart with PWC Water Resource Construction stated that the Water Resource Construction crews are working on water service renewals in the Montclair Subdivision prior to the City of Fayetteville resurfacing and standard water/sewer maintenance throughout the system. The water main rehab contractor is working on Sunset Avenue & Seabrook Road. Sanford has completed the water main replacement project around the Market House however they are now working on the storm drain project for the City of Fayetteville. There is also a brick paver project on Hay Street that will start the approx. 1st week of January 2019.

It's fall, and that means more deer on the roads. Here's how to avoid a wreck.

Fall means the return of cool weather, changing leaves and pumpkin-spiced everything. It's also the time of year drivers are most likely to hit a deer.

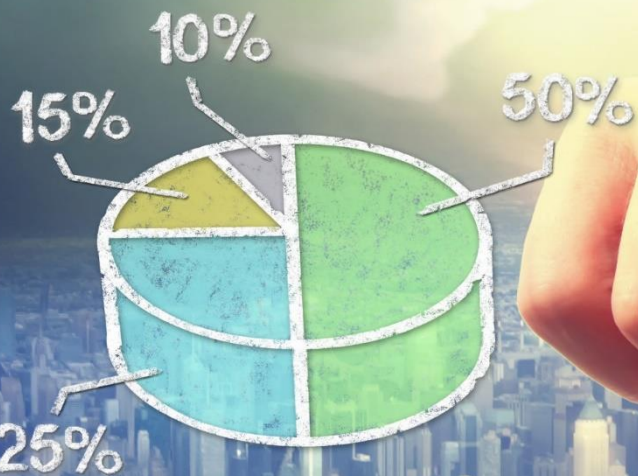
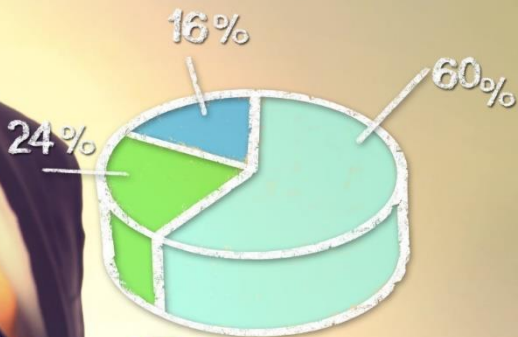
Hunting by humans and mating by the deer mean more of them are on the move, at a time of year when shorter days mean more people are driving after dark or before sunrise. Nearly half of deer-vehicle collisions in North Carolina take place in October, November and December, with about 22 percent happening in November alone.

NCDOT offers the following tips to avoid hitting a deer and to stay safe if you do:

- Slow down at posted deer-crossings and in heavily wooded areas, especially during the late afternoon and evening.
- Always wear your seat belt. Most people injured in deer-vehicle collisions were not wearing one.
- Be aware that most deer-vehicle crashes occur in areas where deer are more likely to travel, such as near bridges or overpasses, railroad tracks, streams and ditches.
- Drive with high beams on when possible and watch for eyes reflecting in the headlights.
- Remember that deer often travel in groups, so if you see one cross in front of you, look out for others.
- If you encounter deer on the road, slow down and blow your horn with one long blast to frighten them away.
- Leave more space between your vehicle and the one in front of you, especially at night. If the car ahead hits a deer, you could become involved in the crash.
- Do not swerve to avoid hitting a deer. You could lose control of your vehicle, causing a more serious crash.
- Do not rely on devices such as deer whistles or reflectors to deter deer; these devices have not proven to reduce deer-vehicle crashes.
- If you hit a deer, do not touch the animal. A frightened and wounded deer can hurt you or further injure itself. Better to get your car off the road if possible and call 911.

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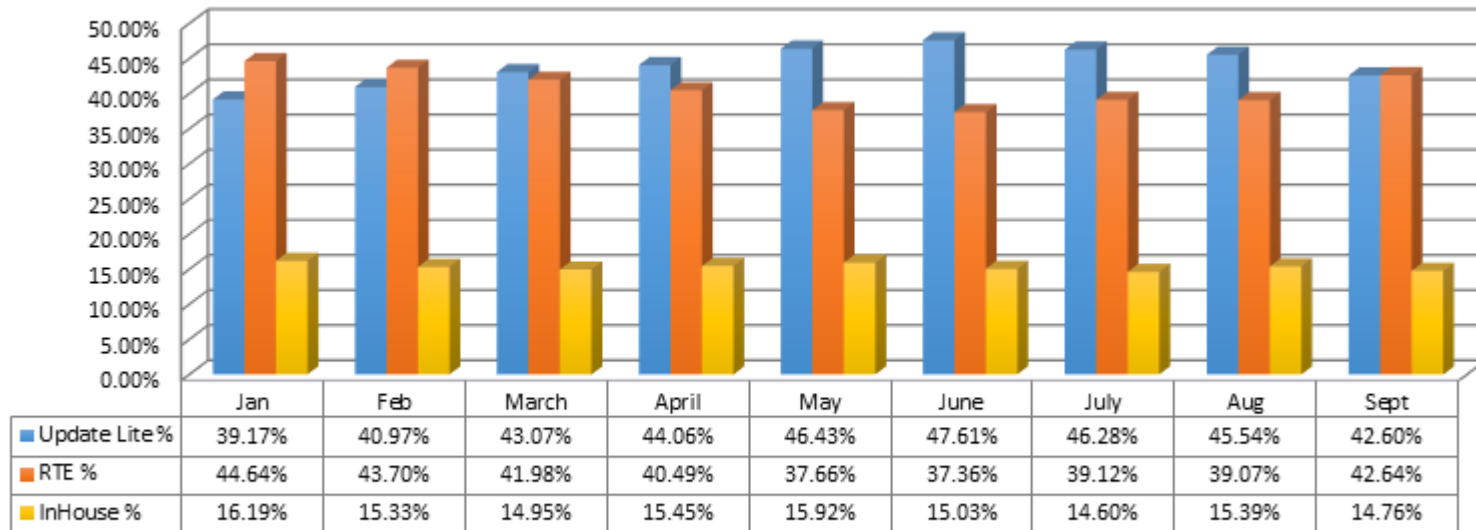

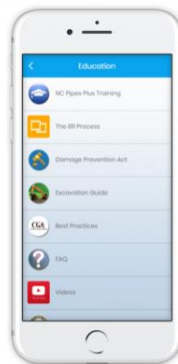
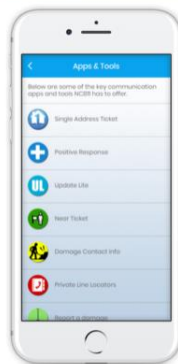
Update % Breakdown
