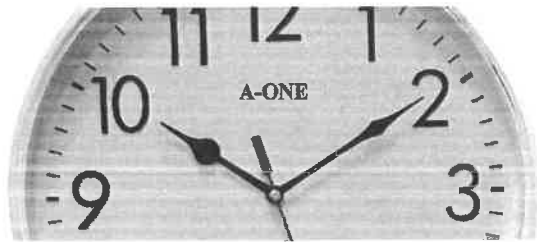

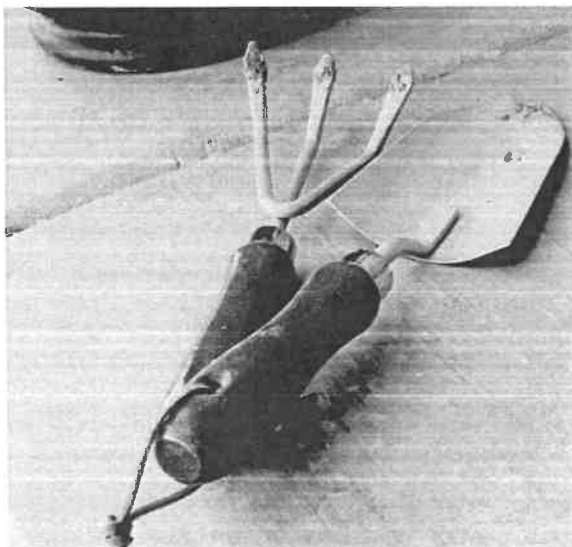

Wait the Required Time



North Carolina law requires a three working days notice be given to the utility owners before your digging begins. Once all underground facilities have been marked, you may begin your excavation activities.

It may be quite surprising, but damage to buried utility lines can occur when doing typical home improvement projects such as putting up a fence, mailbox post, swing set or clothesline pole, building a deck or room addition, planting a garden, trees, and shrubbery. If you are beginning a home improvement project that requires digging or adjusting the grade of your property, please contact North Carolina 811 before digging.

Call 811 Before You Dig!

Today, more and more of the utility companies that supply your home with power, heat, water, telephone, sewer, gas and cable television service are delivering those services underground. It is also possible that these buried service lines are close to the surface, making digging a dangerous endeavor. Fortunately, you can find out where utility owned lines are buried on your property by making a toll-free call to North Carolina 811 by dialing 811 . When you make that call, we will notify our member utility companies of your excavation needs and they will locate their buried utility lines, free of charge.



Making the Call

During your call, you will be asked a series of questions designed to help pinpoint the location of your project. At the conclusion of your call, you will be given a ticket number and a verbal list of utility companies that are notified by North Carolina 811. This does not mean each member listed owns buried utilities on your property or that every utility company is a member with North Carolina 811. You will want to write down the names of the utility companies for easy reference.

Respect the marks!



Before digging, be sure that all utilities have responded to your locate request. The North Carolina 811 representative will advise you during your call of the member utility owners we notify for you. The underground facilities located on your property will be identified by color coded paint, stakes or flags. It is the responsibility of the caller to contact a utility locating company to have any private lines located. Once the underground facilities have been located it is very important that the stakes, flags or paint not be disturbed. You may want to explain to young children that the brightly colored flags are not toys and should not be removed from the ground.



What do I do if I damage an underground facility?

The underground facility is damaged by any piece of equipment. Something as simple as a scrape, dent, or crease the surface of the ground around a buried utility type of damage usually does not cause immediate harm, it may later cause a break or leak as the protection erodes. If this should happen, cover up the line with dirt. Then, contact the utility company to repair the damage. A quick repair can prevent future service interruption and personal injury. If the damage is a situation that threatens life or property, call 911 immediately.



What happens if I do not call before I dig?

If you do not find out where it is safe to dig in your yard, it is quite possible that you will find a buried utility service and potentially create a life threatening situation.



- Damaging a telephone or fiber optic line may not only cause you inconvenience by the loss of your telephone, cable TV or Internet service, but could deprive the neighborhood of emergency assistance. This would make it impossible for law enforcement and emergency personnel to get the information they need to keep you and your community safe.
- Damaging gas lines could result in serious burn injuries and escaping gas could result in a community evacuation.
- Damaging an electrical line could cause major burns or electrocution.



Tolerance

The tolerance zone is a buffer of a marked utility line. The North Carolina requires a clearance on each side of the marked line. Within this tolerance zone, if digging, please use extreme caution and a hand shovel.

A note to homeowners

According to the North Carolina Underground Utility Safety Prevention Act, homeowners are responsible for notifying utilities upon obtaining a utility easement or right-of-way. Before exercising your right of exemption are:

Do you know, beyond a doubt

1. *Where all of the utilities are located on your property.*
2. *If a right-of-way with utilities runs on your property.*

Preventing pipeline emergencies is important to employees of natural gas companies like ours, because we are part of your community and are your neighbors too.

DID YOU KNOW YOU CAN HELP TO PREVENT NATURAL GAS PIPELINE EMERGENCIES?

Though natural gas pipeline incidents are uncommon, you should know their signs.

- **Look.** Blowing dirt, bubbling creeks or ponds, dry spots in moist areas or dead plants surrounded by live, green plants may indicate a natural gas leak.
- **Listen.** Near a gas appliance or line, there may be a hissing sound when natural gas is leaking.
- **Smell.** Stay alert for the distinctive, rotten-egg-like smell of natural gas. You should take action anytime you detect even a small amount of this odor in the air.

DON'T BREAK THE LAW—CALL BEFORE YOU DIG.

It's a fact: Excavation work, including digging (even in the yard!) and plowing, is the most common cause of natural gas emergencies. Before excavation of any kind takes place, state law requires that you call a ONE-CALL number so all utility lines can be professionally marked prior to digging.

SUSPECT A LEAK? TAKE ACTION

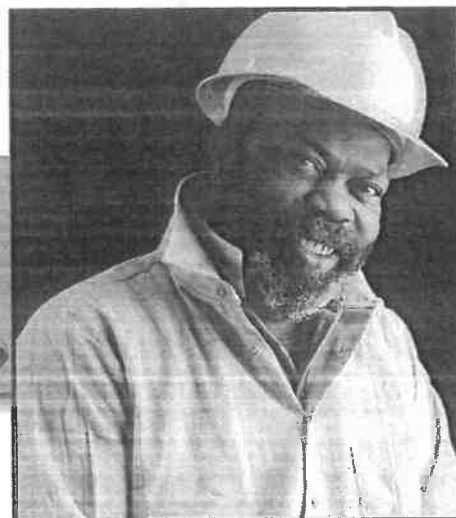
1. **Leave.** If you ever detect a natural gas leak, LEAVE IMMEDIATELY. Don't try to find or stop the leak.
2. **Do not touch anything** electrical before you leave or use a telephone, even a cell phone. Do not smoke, turn appliances or lights on or off, or operate any vehicle or equipment that could cause a spark.
3. **Call.** Once you are out of the suspected area, immediately call your local natural gas utility or pipeline company. If the smell of natural gas is particularly strong, also call 9-1-1.

- Escuche. Cerca de un aparato o línea de gas, pudiera haber un zumbido cuando hay una fuga de gas natural.
- Olor. Manténgase alerta de un olor distintivo de huevos podridos de gas natural. Debe tomar acción en cualquier momento que usted detecta este olor en el aire aunque sea una cantidad pequeña.

NO VIOLE LA LEY—LLAME ANTES DE CAVAR

Es un hecho. Trabajo de excavación, incluyendo cavar (incluso en el patio) y arando (cultivando) es la causa más común de emergencias de gas natural. Antes de cualquier tipo de excavación, la ley estatal requiere de llamar un número de Una-Llamada (One-Call) para que todas la líneas de utilidad puedan ser profesionalmente marcado antes de excavar.

**¿SOSPECHA UNA FUGA? ¡TOME
ACCIÓN!**

1. Salga. Si alguna vez detecta una fuga de gas natural, **SALGA INMEDIATAMENTE**. No trate de encontrar o parar la fuga.
2. No toque nada eléctrico antes de salir o use un teléfono, incluso un teléfono celular. No fume, prenda aparatos o encender o apagar luces, o conducir algún vehículo o equipo que podría crear una chispa.
3. Llame. Una vez que estas fuera de la zona sospechosa, llame inmediatamente a su utilidad local de gas natural o compañía de gaseoducto. Si el olor de gas natural es bastante fuerte, también llame al 9-1-1.
